



Crime prevention advice top tip, Think like a Thief!

Take a look at your shed and consider how you would break in. It's worth having a good padlock on the door with no exposed screws. Pay attention to hinges, as these are sometimes easily removable. If you have windows then these could be vulnerable unless they're secured with wire mesh or grills. And keep it locked at all times.

Alarm it

Consider a battery-operated shed alarm. They look low key but they respond to movement or door contact with an extremely loud siren.

Lock it, hide it or mark it

Don't give them the opportunity or the tools to commit a crime. Lock everything away securely. Tools can be locked inside a locker or box or secured with a chain. Secure your bike to the ground or a lockable stand within a locked shed or garage. Visit Sold Secure to search for ground anchors and other locks designed to fix to floors and walls. It's always worth draping an old sheet or blanket over the top of mowers or bikes to keep them covered from view.

Although it might sound like stating the obvious, never leave your garage or shed door unlocked if you're not around. Keep the door closed between uses so that no one can see what's inside. Property mark your items and take photographs of them. Some tools can be painted with your name or postcode and forensic marking is also an option. You can also register any item that has a serial number with immobilize. A locksmith belonging to the Master Locksmith Association can advise you on the most secure shed and garage door security. They can also help you install it. Most also provide full home security surveys.

Mortimer Medical Practice – Patient Participation Group

Total Triage (Anima)

The new Total Triage system, accessed via the online tool Anima, has been in use across the Practice since October 1, 2025. The new system appears to be bedding in well though some challenges remain. The Practice Manager is planning to hold a number of follow up workshops in April and May when patients can raise any issues they are encountering.

Telephone and Online Requests

Telephone calls to the surgery may take longer than usual to be answered as the Reception team is working hard to support patients who do not have internet access, or who need help completing the Anima form. Patients are encouraged to fill in the form themselves if at all possible. Any emails received by Reception will be returned to sender with a link to Anima.

The Practice is also striving to make requesting a medication review as simple as possible. If you need a review, please use the 'Admin Request' option on Anima. Using an Admin Request (rather than a Medical Request) is the quickest and most effective way to let the surgery know what you need, and ensure that the request goes straight to the right team.

Good news for our local Practice.

The Practice Integrated Care Board (ICB) has reported that the Mortimer Medical Practice is now rated above the National Average when it comes to offering appointments, increasing

by 46 per cent since October 2025. What's more, the National Patient Satisfaction Survey placed Mortimer Medical Practice 23rd in the whole of the UK and 2nd in the Primary Care Network the Practice is part of. Good news indeed.

The Dispensary saw a number of changes in January, with Claire leaving to pursue a new adventure while Nicky, Julita and Angie all joined and have already made excellent additions to the team. Dr Kemp is on a four month sabbatical until April 2026.

Staff training will take place from 12noon on Thursday, April 16; Tuesday, July 14, and Wednesday, October 14. Kingsland Surgery and Dispensary will open again from 4pm. Anima requests can still be submitted, and Reception reached in an emergency on 01568 708214.

Did Not Attend (DNA)

In January, 100 appointments were missed without reason – that's 1.5 days of time wasted. Various ways of reducing DNAs are being investigated, with a review expected in the Spring.



Gardening for Biodiversity by Chris Evans

To say we are on the verge of ecosystem collapse is an understatement. It's already happening in areas around our villages and in our gardens. Green deserts of closely mown, sprayed lawns, beds of hybrid flowers with little nectar for wildlife back onto similar monoculture farm deserts of highly tilled, engineered and sprayed crops. Small "islands" of biodiversity are refuges, but when they're too small, a tipping point is reached and populations collapse, having effects throughout the food chain. I remember in my youth in the village of Luston, many properties had "neglected" orchards behind them, havens for wildlife, teeming with insects, birds and mammals. One by one they have been "tidied up", cleared and usually built upon. In our comfy rural settlements, the story is of declining bio-diversity and wildlife populations.

But there are lots of things we can do, from small scale, easy interventions to more radical out-of-the box ideas, and bigger policies that parish, county and national councils need to take up.

1. Lots of websites tell you what you can do in "ten top tips for biodiversity", but rarely the first and most important action – **stop doing harmful things**: spraying pesticides, fungicides and herbicides; less tillage/bare soil (use mulching/min. till); less monocultures.
2. Mow long and less – not short, or often – leave islands of no/less mown
3. Provide habitat for breeding and foraging – think diversity, create microclimates: ponds (even washing up bowl-sized), rock piles, wild undisturbed areas; planks, sheets of tin on the ground; log piles, brush piles; leaf piles, compost piles, bug hotels, hedgehog hotels; bird boxes, bird baths, bird feeders.
4. Provide food sources (start at the base of the pyramid: plants with leaves, flowers & seeds) – rich soil and organic matter ->

food for bacteria & fungi -> food for insects
-> food for birds, mammals

5. Understand what you have (resources) – connect with nature; observe

Attracting insects involves planting wild flowers, herbs, fruit trees, and other useful species. Here are some examples:

Ground cover: clover, trefoil, yellow rattle, lawn chamomile, thyme, vetch, pansy, wild garlic, sedum, violets, crocus

Herb layer: coneflower, marjoram, oregano, hyssop, rosemary, lavender, zinnia, nasturtium (also a climber), comfrey, borage, cosmos, mints, lemon balm, ox-eye daisy, poppy, lupin, calendula, marigold, sage, mountain mint, fennel, hypericum, rose

Shrub layer: sunflower, buddleia, tansy, currants/soft fruit, nettle, Oregon grape (*Berberis*), *Cotoneasta*, foxglove, mullein, teasel

Tree layer: crab apple, serviceberry, *Eleagnus*, Buckthorn, hawthorn, Strawberry tree (*Arbutus*), elder, rowan, lime, wild cherry, birch, holly

Vines/climbers: passion flower, clematis, honeysuckle, ivy, wisteria, rambling rose

Plant borders, beds, corners, verges. Most pollinator/insect-friendly flowering plants are also going to give a WOW benefit of beautiful flowers. Don't just get hybrids bred for colour though – they often aren't good nectar sources like native wildflowers are.

It's no longer enough to think that "our" garden is OK as a haven. There needs to be extensive, wide corridors of wildlife-friendly habitat within and around cities, towns and villages. Everyone has a part to play.



Spring Soiree at Wigmore Abbey

Visit one of Herefordshire's hidden gems

Wigmore Abbey must be one of the most fascinating historical locations in Herefordshire. Founded in the 12th century, it's been a private residence since the dissolution of the monasteries, which has meant limited opportunities to visit. However, all of that changes for one day on 28 March, when you're invited to attend a splendid Spring Soiree in the Abbey's great hall and Abbot's Parlour, courtesy of the Mortimer History Society (MHS).

The medieval Mortimer family has strong connections to the abbey and many of its most famous members lie buried amongst its ruins. This special event will mark the 700th anniversary of Roger Mortimer's arrival in England, when he returned from exile as the ally of Queen Isabella. Together, they forced the abdication of Isabella's husband, Edward II, and salvaged the crown for Isabella and Edward's son, Edward III.

"It's hard to overestimate how important Wigmore was for a brief few years in the 14th century," says MHS Vice Chair, Annie Garthwaite. "For a time, during Edward III's minority, Isabella and Roger ruled England. This event really is an opportunity to touch a piece of history usually hidden from our sight."

The Soiree, (held indoors, so don't worry about the weather) will feature a festival of medieval music, much of which would have been familiar to Roger and Isabella in their day. There'll also be a buffet of delicious medieval-style food and drink.

Tickets are just £25 and can be reserved at www.mortimerhistorysociety.org.uk/events. All profits will go to this year's MHS Bursary Appeal.



Report from your County Councillor

As I write this the B4361 should be on day one of a three-week closure. However, following an emergency closure of the A4113 at Leintwardine due to a landslip, a good dose of common sense at Herefordshire Council resulted in the works being postponed to ensure traffic continued to flow smoothly in this corner of the council. Whilst I welcome the decision to postpone the work, I hope that it will be rescheduled as soon as possible given that its purpose is to address recommendations from the Coroner following the tragic accident in that location in June 2022.

Given the current state of our highways network it would be strange if I did not devote part of this column to it. Whilst I am appalled at the recent deterioration, the unprecedented volumes of rain at the start of this year have had a huge impact. It has clearly shown that more investment is needed in drainage to stop the water pooling on the roads and damaging the tarmac. I would also echo the calls of the residents I speak to who say that although they understand potholes will form, they can't understand why the repairs are so poor quality. Hopefully the replacement of Balfour Beatty by M Group Highways on the 1st June 2026 will mark a real turning point in the way repairs are conducted and our roads maintained. In the

meantime, please continue to log potholes where you can using the Herefordshire Council Reporting App which can be found by a quick google search.

Highways and flooding are not the only part of my job (although sometimes it does seem that way). I am also consulted on planning applications across Bircher Ward and I am sure you will all have seen that the planning application for a travellers site at Comberton has been re-tabled this month. The applicant has sought to address some of the objections from their previous application. Although the formal consultation date has passed, I would urge you to submit your comments (either for or against) as these will be considered by the planners in their final deliberations.


This is an interesting and rewarding part-time role and provides the opportunity for those with accounting and/or administrative experience to act as the Clerk and Responsible Financial Officer.

All you want to know

THE RHS CHELSEA FLOWER SHOW

On Tuesday 27th January we welcomed again Tamsin Westhorpe, author, and proprietor of Stockton Bury Gardens. She has been a judge at Chelsea for ten years.

The RHS Chelsea Flower Show was founded in 1913 and occupies a 23 acre site. Described by Tamsin as the Paris catwalk fashion show of the plant world it exists to fulfill the following functions:- to promote cutting edge design, introduce new plants, products and innovations, promote the industry, create discussion, raise awareness of causes and encourage new gardeners. The Great Pavilion is large enough to accommodate 5100 red buses and 168000 visitors attend each year.

It is a great privilege to be asked to judge Chelsea and it is a voluntary role. The judge designate will do little during the first two years except watch and listen. Judges must possess a skill set comprising gardener, landscaper, designer and plant- person. There are judges for different categories – show gardens, small gardens, trade stands – and they are not permitted to cross over. Judging takes two days and takes place over the weekend. A maximum of 36 marks is awarded, a Gold medal requires 30 to 36 marks and surprisingly there is not a set number of medals for each category, Gold, Silver Gilt, Silver and Bronze. Other categories include

Best in Show, People's Choice and Construction Award. The judging panel is anxious that exhibitors should do as well as possible and feedback is always given.

Creating a Chelsea garden is not for first timers. It is a 15 month process and selection involves factors including design, budget, sponsorship and carbon footprint. Plant health is critical, some trees are quarantined for over a year and a list of proscribed plants is issued to designers. Show gardens are built in 19 days, remain on site for 30 days and are dismantled in 5 days. The judges must consider how well the brief is interpreted, overall impression and construction, hard landscaping must conform to building regulations and the planting design, association and implementation. The head must rule the heart, these gardens have to work as after the Show they will be dismantled to give pleasure elsewhere. The RHS checks that this is done.

Tamsin's illuminating insight left us with renewed admiration, not only for those who create these amazing gardens, but for those who judge them with meticulous care. *Ghislaine Arundale*
